Dissertation: *Ideas and Intelligibility: Hume's Conceptual Skepticism*
My dissertation is a study of Hume's conceptual skepticism in the *Treatise of Human Nature*. Whereas epistemological skepticism aims to show that a class of beliefs lacks epistemic merit, conceptual skepticism aims to show that a class of beliefs is unintelligible, incomprehensible, or contentless. It is orthodoxy among commentators that conceptual skepticism is of peripheral concern to Hume, its importance dwarfed by that of his naturalistic ambitions and epistemological skepticism. I show that this underestimates the scope, force, and sophistication of Hume's conceptual skepticism. Attention to conceptual skepticism allows us to resolve long-standing interpretive problems and sheds new light on the epistemology of the *Treatise*.
